HOW I GOT TO THE MWC

My name is Deborah (Reid) Ward, your new Recording Secretary. My introduction to MWC came from Dottie Schwarz. I knew Dottie from our Zumba class at COA and later as a "neighbor" with both of us living off Brandt Island Road. As you know, she is a wonderful warm person and shared a lot of good things about the club and encouraged me to get involved. The objectives of the club being educational, philanthropic, civil and social were also a good fit for me.

I grew up in Dedham with a brother and sister. In 1962 my parents bought a cottage in Crescent Beach and our family became "summer residents" and my siblings and I "summer kids." Our childhood was spent enjoying all that Mattapoisett had to offer. Lots of swimming, walks to Gulf Hill with our buddies, playing cards and bowling at our own 4 lane bowling alley in Raymond Hall. Happily,



our cottage is still in the family and owned by my niece who has made it a more permanent residence.

After I married my husband, we moved to Walpole where our first son was born. In 1983 we purchased our own piece of Mattapoisett in Harbor Beach. History was repeating itself where my son and later his brother became "summer kids" like my siblings and me. We later moved to Avon, Connecticut, with my husband's job but remained loyal to our ties to Mattapoisett and traveled back and forth for many years.

Retirement came and we moved to East Tennessee and lived in a beautiful valley in the foothills of the Great Smoky Mountains. We were near some of my husband's family which was very special. We would return to our cottage in Harbor Beach every year for at least 4 months and spend time with our family whenever possible. However, as time went on and our first grandson was born, we decided in 2020 to sell our Tennessee home and move back to Massachusetts. The cottage became our full-time residence until we found a more permanent home in Mattapoisett with more amenities than Harbor Beach.

My career path began in Norfolk County Land Court where I acquired a lot of knowledge about land records, engineering plans, appurtenances and encumbrances affecting properties. It was a great introduction to an area I found very interesting. As a young person, I was lucky to be surrounded by many professional people whose guidance helped me as I moved on later in my career. In Connecticut, I went to work for the Town Clerk and Town Engineer in Simsbury on a part time basis. After a few years when my sons were in school, I accepted a full-time position as an Assistant Town Clerk. This started my path on becoming a State of Connecticut Certified Municipal Clerk. The program involved attending classes endorsed by the University of Connecticut and a final exam after completing the five segments of required Town Clerk knowledge and responsibilities. Eventually, I left Simsbury and became an Assistant Town Clerk in Farmington to be closer to home. I also found time to put all my miscellaneous college courses together and attended our local community college to complete my degree. Although challenging at times juggling work and home responsibilities, I accomplished my goal. My retirement from Farmington was bittersweet. I enjoyed my job and the versatile duties and responsibilities that came with it. Every day there seemed to be something new. Mostly however, I found it rewarding serving the public. From our municipal to federal elections, land records for the town, vital statistics and issuing various licenses, interacting with people was very fulfilling.

I know I have big shoes to fill as Recording Secretary, but I look forward to the year ahead and meeting even more people! Since the club is involved in Harbor Days, I will see you then!

The weather quickly deteriorated, but volunteers didn't seem to notice the pouring rain. One woman gathered four 50-lb bags of trash just from walking from the library to Route. 6.

Four board members representing the Friends of the Mattapoisett Rail Trail, Jenn Wong, Liz DiCarlo, Dick Grahn, and Ann Bryant, all pitched in and covered a large area that is enjoyed by many.


2023-2024 HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE TREASURER

The Mattapoisett Woman's Club had a very successful year. We ended the fiscal year March 31, 2024 in a good position with over \$5,500 more than the prior year. This additional cash was important to reestablish pre-pandemic account balances and ensure a "safety net" for future challenges. Great work, Ladies!

Net income from fundraisers after fundraising expenses totaled \$18,870.96.

We distributed \$6,500 in scholarships and over \$5,500 to local organizations when including designated speaker fees.






Garden Group Happenings
