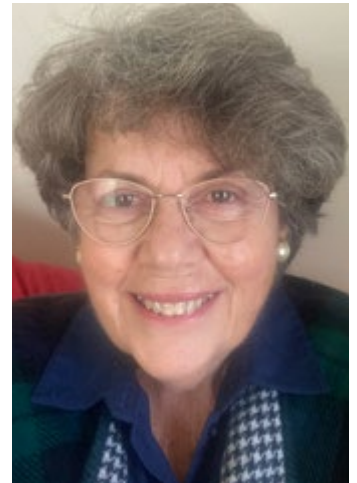

After the military, Elaine embarked on a career of her own as an elementary school teacher for 20 years in Whitman-Hanson before moving to Mattapoisett in 2005.

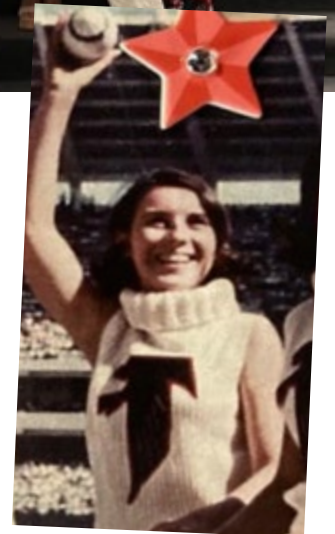

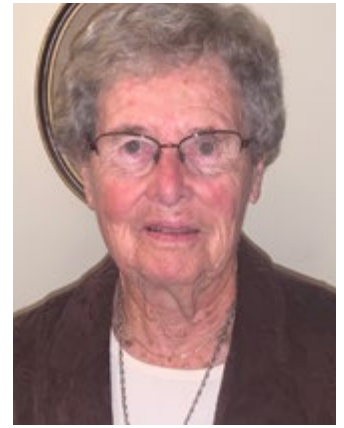
Literature Group

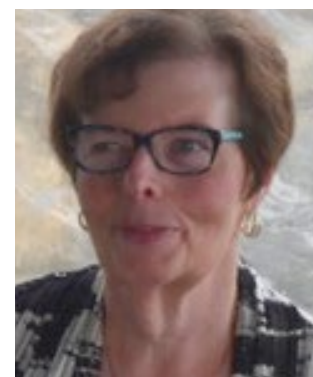


Knitting & Hand Crafts

Garden Group Happenings

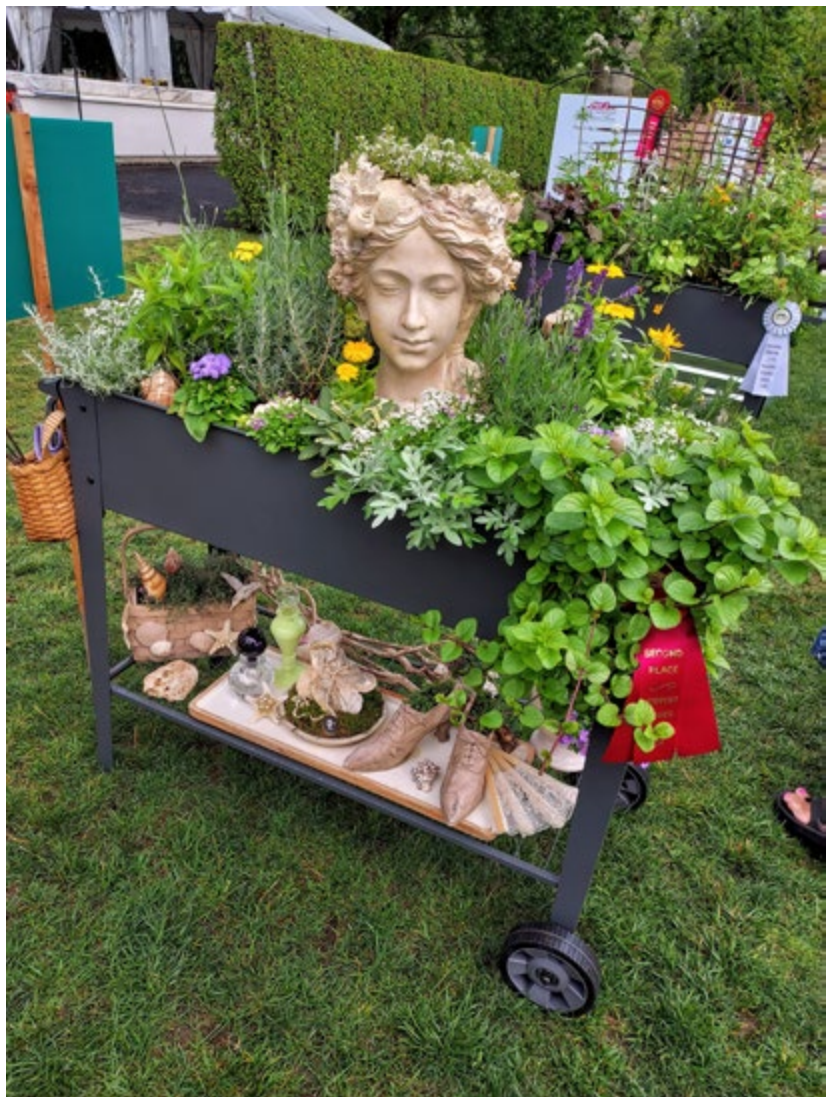
“Lady Rosemary Summer-Thyme”

The Garden Club challenge for this year’s 2024 Newport Flower Show was to create an herb or vegetable-themed garden. To house the garden each group was provided with an identical garden cart with rules that the display be primarily 60% herbs or vegetables. The rest of the composition was up to the team of Sharon Doyon and Susan Perkins of the Garden Group.

The focal point of their entry was a Grecian styled woman’s head planter. Susan thought it reminded her of the gilded age of Newport and appropriate for the Breaker’s Mansion location of the show. Displays were judged on the variety and quality of plant material used, identification key card and an overall pleasing design. Plant materials were diverse and included several kinds of sage, creeping rosemary, lavenders, and mint. Both described this project as a tough one, trying to get the plants to grow and mesh well together into a design-worthy arrangement.

Our Lady proved to be a little too “new” looking so a faux paint finish was applied to make her appear like an aged garden statue. The bottom shelf of the cart featured her accessories: a floral purse, delicate thyme-filled shoes and lace fan. After careful nurturing, pruning, battling bug infestations and last minute additions, “Lady Rosemary Summer-Thyme” came to be! Sharon’s daughter Nicole created her wonderful name as befitting a Newport grande dame.

Though it was challenging, both enjoyed the creative process and working together. Their efforts paid off as they were awarded a Second Place Ribbon. Afterwards the herbs were replanted into various herb container gardens which were sold to the public. Happy to say all expenses were covered and a donation was made to our club.

Thanks to Pastor Michael of the MCC and Cindy Johnson's gift of an air conditioner this year, the making and baking of the pies were most comfortable. Though there was a good bit of hard work involved, there was also a lot of laughter, despite the 90 degree weather outside.

In addition to the pies sold on Saturday, there were 13 pies made by Peg Olney with the help of Beth Inglis and Kristen McCormack. The accompanying photos show auctioneer Cindy Johnson assuring that the paintings were true works of art whose value was sure to increase in the years to come. Son David is holding Sandy's purchase, Brad has Barb's choice and son Josh is with Peg's. According to Peg, "The frame I have is perfect for the painting and is another reason why I liked it. Now I have to decide where to hang it. I chose the painting of narcissus in an old brown coffee pot because Priscilla's yard was always full of narcissus in the spring and she was always generous in sharing the bulbs."

Sandy wrote "I love mine and will think of Priscilla and Brad every time I look at it." It is of an unusual peach-colored rhododendron from the Hathaway property. She recalls Priscilla telling her that the white daffodils at the Friends Meeting House were a gift from the Falmouth Friends of the Quakers who built the Meeting House.

Priscilla, Ann Shepley and Peg Olney were integral to the garden group when Barb joined in 2012. She wrote, "They were a terrific team who kept us moving and motivated. Priscilla always had a friendly smile and kind words. I chose the pink hollyhocks by the rock wall bordering the water with boats bobbing nearby."

An accomplished artist, Priscilla lent her talent to the Club with her sketches which appeared in the Club's publication of the "Doorways to Dining" cookbook back in 1985, which many of us still use with fond memories of Priscilla.
