HOW I GOT TO THE MWC

I first came to Mattapoisett one day in the early 1980's, shortly after I had moved to Massachusetts. Living in Quincy, I resolved to explore the rest of the state, and absent any other plans, I routinely headed off in my car to explore a different part of the state each weekend. One Saturday or Sunday, the date now long forgotten, I headed out for New Bedford and adjacent South Coast towns. After several hours in the Whaling Museum, walking around downtown, and enjoying a harbor cruise, I drove slowly east, taking in the Green Street/ Fort Phoenix area of Fairhaven, and then...Mattapoisett. I thought the town was lovely and seemed part of another era and remember thinking, "I wonder who lives here. Where do they work? What does it take to live in such a magical place and still manage the practical demands of life?"



Time passed and I regularly returned to the South Coast to review theatre for a Plymouth publication. One night in early 1988, I came to the Gateway Playhouse in Wareham and was seated next to Michael Couture, who was reviewing for The Enterprise. We struck up a conversation, and he asked me to join him at the Zeiterion later that week, where he was covering the New Bedford Concert Series. We reviewed many plays and concerts that year, many on the South Coast. Michael was living in Mattapoisett, and he showed me around the town and local environs. We married that November, and he relocated to my cramped Quincy condo while we house-hunted. Nothing we saw felt right for us. Finally realizing that both of us shared an image of our perfect house being in Mattapoisett, I suggested we abandon the more practical search in Metro Boston, "bite the bullet and commute from Mattapoisett." We found our home the following weekend.

We moved in on a rainy, spring day. By the time the movers left, the house was filled with boxes and mud. I remember saying to Michael, "I hope you really, really like this house, because I'm only leaving feet first." I'm still there.

For the first twenty-something years, I commuted to work as a state planner and had little time to engage in town activities. I wore out cars on 495 with an hour-and-a-half commute, but getting home to Mattapoisett was always worth it. I retired in 2015 to spend more time with Michael, whose health was failing. We continued to enjoy the area's theatre and classical music offerings, and I joined the MWC's Great Decisions group. After Michael's death in 2022, I decided it was time to get more involved in the MWC. I joined that spring, and will always treasure the warm welcome I received. An avid reader, I am enjoying being introduced to new authors and styles in the Literature Group. I'm hoping that my neglected garden will be much improved by the seventy-five mixed daffodils I just planted, ordered through the MWC. And Ladies Who Lunch is a favorite monthly outing. Most important of all, I have made many new friends in the group.

Woodrow Wilson Nickel, age 105, feels his life ebbing away. But when he learns giraffes are going extinct, he finds himself recalling the unforgettable experience he cannot take to his grave.

It's 1938. The Great Depression lingers. Hitler is threatening Europe, and world-weary Americans long for wonder. They find it in two giraffes who miraculously survive a hurricane while crossing the Atlantic. What follows is a twelve-day road trip in a custom truck to deliver Southern California's first giraffes to the San Diego Zoo. Behind the wheel is the young Dust Bowl rowdy Woodrow. Inspired by true events, the tale weaves real-life figures with fictional ones, including the world's first female zoo director, a crusty old man with a past, a young female photographer with a secret, and assorted reprobates as spotty as the giraffes.

Part adventure, part historical saga, and part coming-of-age love story, West with Giraffes explores what it means to be changed by the grace of animals, the kindness of strangers, the passing of time, and a story told before it's too late.

Knitting & Hand Crafts




Walking Group

VICTORIA'S SECRET

Sitting down with a scrumptious selection of goodies provided by Dottie Schwarz & Bobbie Oakley, the Mattapoisett Women's Garden Club gathered on October 2, 2024 to hear invited guest Nancy Masson present an extremely interesting lecture at the Mattapoisett Library. Slides featuring some of her inspired water garden designs and extraordinary propagation techniques for the Victoria amazonica, Nancy captivated the well-attended audience of several dozen gardening enthusiasts for over an hour.

A former medical researcher and passionate scientist, Nancy became enthralled with water lilies over 40 years ago. Encouraged by her young son's interest in the plant large enough to stand upon, she traveled to the Amazon in the 1990's to study the DNA of the giant 7-foot diameter water platter. She has since been at the leading forefront of research, propagation, and distribution of this amazing plant. Nancy showed wonderful slides and discussed the fascinating lily from a botanical, sociological, historical, and horticultural perspective. The first published description of the genus was by botanist John Lindley in October, 1837. He named the genus Victoria af-





ter Queen Victoria. The current name, Victoria amazonica, did not come into use until the 20th Century. Nancy and her colleagues have learned so much more about this unique plant in the last 180 years! As she shared her stories of adventure, research, and scientific undertakings to both preserve and build upon others' horticultural knowledge, I couldn't help but be thankful for passionate citizen scientists. And to think, Nancy lives right here in Acushnet– she's another Southcoast gem!

For those who missed the program, but would like to find out more about Nancy or the Amazon lily, one can look on-line at San Francisco Conservatory of Flowers in Golden Gate Park which displays the lily in a Victorian setting along with a giant replica of her secret admirer, the scarab beetle .

RECIPE CORNER

Here's one of my Fall favorites:

Apple Walnut Supreme Cake

Beat at high speed until lemon colored:

- 1 1/3 cup canola oil
- 2 cups sugar
- 3 large eggs

Sift, measure and combine dry ingredients:

- 3 cups flour
- 1 tablspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon salt

Stir and mix slowly into wet ingredients

Then slowly mix in:

1 teaspoon vanilla

3 cups apples, 1/2 inch diced

1 cup walnuts, chopped

Pour into bundt or 9x13 greased and floured pan. Bake @ 350 for 45-60 minutes. Test for doneness. Cool on wire rack before removing cake from pan.

Optional:

Sprinkle with powdered sugar or Lemon glaze: 1 cup 10X sugar 1 1/2 tablespoons lemon juice

1/2 teaspoon vanilla

1 tablespoon corn syrup

COMPOSTING - What Was Old is New Again

I was talking to Lois Ennis a while ago about Black Earth Compost and curbside kitchen waste pickup. She told me that back in the '50's, people would have a hole dug in their yard, insert a metal container with a tight lid that animals couldn't get into and then it would hold their kitchen waste, and a pig farmer would come around once a week and empty it for pig feed.

Seventy plus years have gone by and here we are trying to find a way to recycle kitchen scraps instead of adding them to a landfill. I was surprised to see an email from Laura at Climate Reality South Coast stating that Fairhaven was going to begin curbside composting. I contacted Tom at Black Earth who confirmed they were beginning a new route from Marion to Fairhaven. I learned that they were signing up households along Rte. 6. I googled how far I live from Rte.6 and found it's half a mile. I was able to sign up for curbside composting –Hurrah!!



I have a small countertop recycling container that I

use to collect vegetable scraps, banana peels, eggshells, coffee grounds, etc. But I still had to toss meat, bones, grease, salad dressing and lots of other kitchen waste into the regular trash bag because I didn't want to encourage animals to root through my compost bin in the backyard. Now it ALL goes into the countertop container and then into the bigger, lined compost bin which has a one-time charge. Pick-up is every other week, and the cost is \$89 for a 6-month subscription. As more people subscribe to Black Earth, the cost will be lower. Service can be suspended for 4 weeks or more for seasonal residents. A free bag of compost is offered each spring.

The first pickup day was Friday, October 18th. I rolled the bin to the curb and went for a bike ride. Before I got back, the truck had come and gone, leaving 2 rolls of large compostable bags to use to line the green bin.
