I was involved with the Club until I filled up the babysitting room with 4 sons!

When I went back to work, I could not attend meetings or events as they were during the day so I regretfully left. Kate Brown called me in September of 2023 after I retired and invited me to go to a meeting with her. I did not hesitate to join. It is so good to be back

# Report of the Ad-Hoc Committee on the Mission Statement and Goals of the Mattapoisett Woman's Club

Submitted on December 19, 2024 by Katherine Gaudet, Chair; Kate Brown; Sandra Hering; Cindy Johnson; and Gail Roberts

At the October Executive Board meeting, a Mission Committee was formed to review the Club's four Goals and prepare a Mission Statement. This would define the Club's identity, guide its purpose, give it focus and direction forward, and hopefully attract, motivate, and engage new members.

Seven meetings and countless hours later, the mission statement and goals were presented to the Executive Board. 

In twelve luminous stories set across three centuries, The History of Sound examines the unexpected ways the past returns to us and how love and loss are entwined and transformed over generations. Shattuck's inventive, exquisite stories transport readers from 1700s Nantucket to the contemporary woods of New Hampshire and beyond—into landscapes both enduring and unmistakably modern. Memories, artifacts, paintings, and journals resurface in surprising and poignant ways among evocative beaches, forests, and orchards, revealing the secrets, misunderstandings, and love that linger across centuries.

Written with breathtaking humanity and humor, The History of Sound is a love letter to New England, a radiant conversation between past and present, and a moving meditation on the abiding search for home.


