A couple of weeks ago I'd started writing an essay for consideration for a writer's calendar. My first rough draft was 536 words, and I was pleased with my writing. Not only do I love writing and talking about writing, I enjoy penning about the craft itself. Writing is a subject I am passionate about.

Then I checked the guidelines for this particular piece. It had to be 300 words or less. 300 words! This is going to be impossible! I am a wordy person; I like talking. And talking. I revel in regaling others with the most mundane details of my life.

I've had to edit many times before, cutting a 500-word newspaper piece down to 300 and for essay contests that limit submissions to 1,000 words or less when my initial rough draft contained 1,500. Once I get into it, I even enjoy it. But those initial attempts still feel quite painful. Each morning, I looked at this piece and edited it, and each morning, the word count gradually diminished.

This morning, I was down to 364 words. So close, and yet so far. I was sure nothing more could be cut without the essay losing all meaning. I set it aside for a while and talked to my husband about some upsetting events of the past few days. I asked him what he was thinking of it all. Not much for expressing feelings, he nevertheless struggled to vocalize the disappointment and sadness he was dealing with. As he talked, I felt my heart swelling with love for him, an appropriate feeling given that it is Valentine's Day.

I went over to him and hugged him. "I have never felt closer to you than I do right now," I said, and I realized the truth of what I was saying. Each day since his cancer diagnosis on June 28th, 2006, I have felt my love for him deepening. I am amazed and astounded of how it has continued to grow.

My husband went to work this morning knowing he is loved. That is a Valentine's gift all of us yearn for and deserve, genuine love. It isn't the chocolate and flowers or the expensive steak dinners that make us feel loved. It might be the heartfelt hug or the simple words I said as my husband went out the door this morning, "I'm here for you. I love you."

After he left, I returned to my still-wordy essay, those thoughts uppermost in my mind. Sometimes the simple words are the best. I began the arduous task of editing and when I finished, I checked my word count: 297! HAPPY VALENTINE'S DAY

HOW I GOT TO THE MWC

I was lucky enough to grow up on Mattapoisett Neck. Back then Mattapoisett was a quiet fishing village with a few small summer cottage enclaves like Crescent Beach, Antassawomack and others. Interstate 195 didn't yet exist so Mattapoisett was more remote than it is today. I grew up in an era where you went outside after school and didn't come home until dark. My most vivid memories of growing up here include spending hours exploring the marshes, building tree houses in the woods, climbing the White Pines, putting on plays with the handful of kids that lived in our remote neighborhood, eating wild Concord grapes, blackberries and winterberries, chewing on sassafras leaves, rowing in old row boats, sailing in our little Sunfish and riding our bikes absolutely everywhere–even to Marion as we grew older. Socializ-



ing consisted of attending a grade school Bowling League at the Bowl-mor once a week and belonging to the local Brownie Troop. All of us eagerly anticipated the arrival of 'the summer kids' in July when for a few short weeks there would be beach fires, swimming, more kids to ride bikes with and of course the weekly Band Concerts!

My curiosity about what the rest of the world had to offer drew me away after I graduated from high school. I lived in Boston for the next 40 years where I raised a family and led several nonprofit and government organizations. I was the founding Executive Director of the Boston Food Bank-only the second one in the country back then! (I love to recount the stories of food executives who told me that it would never work because there was no waste in the food industry.) I went on to serve as Boston's Deputy Budget Director, Deputy Director of the Redevelopment Authority and Director of the Mayor's Office of



Community Services. Returning to my neighborhood roots I continued to lead nonprofit organizations focused on low income youth. Frustrated by the slow progress of education reform, I founded one of the first public charter schools in Massachusetts, the Neighborhood House Charter School in Dorchester. Eager to mentor the next generation of nonprofit leaders, I finished up my career teaching leadership and nonprofit management in Boston University's MBA program.


Once my husband and I retired we yearned to return to the peace and beauty of the outdoors and small town living. I was fortunate that my husband grew up in a similar town to Mattapoisett on the coast of Maine so he felt right at home here! We house hunted during Covid and found the perfect spot where we live today. Joining the Woman's Club was one of the first things I did. I was also looking for a fun activity I could do with my Mom (Luice Moncevitch), a long time resident and retired Mattapoisett school teacher. We were inspired by all that the Woman's Club does for the community and of course there was a Garden Group, Great Decisions and a Walking Group so many of my favorite things! I remember how warmly we were greeted by then President Sandy Hering at the first luncheon my mom and I attended. Since that day I have met so many amazing women and made some terrific new friends. I look forward to continuing my participation this year and in years to come!




A novel based on the life of Elizabeth Winthrop, who married into the family of Governor John Winthrop of the Massachusetts Bay Colony and moved to the wild New World, is "that rare literary accomplishment—living history [that] gives closer reality to a period than do factual records" (Chicago Tribune). In 1631, Elizabeth Winthrop, newly widowed with an infant daughter, set sail for the New World. Against a background of rigidity and conformity she dared to befriend Anne Hutchinson at the moment of her banishment from the Massachusetts Bay Colony; challenge a determined army captain bent on the massacre of her friends the Siwanoy Indians; and, above all, love a man as her heart and her whole being commanded. And so, as a response to her almost unmatched courage and vitality, Governor John Winthrop came to refer to Elizabeth as his "unregenerate niece" in the historical records of the time. Anya Seton's riveting historical novel—deemed by The New York Times as "abundant and juicy entertainment"—portrays the fortitude, humiliation, and ultimate triumph of a woman who believed in a concept of happiness transcending that of her own day.



Great Decisions

Twenty-four members met on January 15th at the Mattapoisett Free Public Library for our first session of the Mattapoisett Woman's Club Great Decisions program. Three others joined in on Zoom and three more came to the meeting, asking to join on the spot, bringing our total to 31 registered members

Great Decisions is a national, civic educational program established in 1918 by the Foreign Policy Association and is America's largest discussion group on world affairs. Our Club has kept this program alive for over 50 years. We follow a text of eight Topic chapters with references and suggested readings and resources on each chapter, along with a companion DVD.



One of our Co-chairs, Ellen Stone from Marion, will lead the fourth chapter, "India Between China, the West and the Global South." Ellen, a retired Interbank Foreign Exchange Trader and a Global Treasury

Management Consultant for Fortune 500 companies is excited to begin the discussion. She has traveled to India and feels strongly about the importance of India's democracy, the largest in the world, with a constitution and a population of over one billion.
