Literature Group



When the enslaved Jim overhears that he is about to be sold to a man in New Orleans, separated from his wife and daughter forever, he decides to hide on nearby Jackson Island until he can formulate a plan. Meanwhile, Huck Finn has faked his own death to escape his violent father, recently returned to town. As all readers of American literature know, thus begins the dangerous and transcendent journey by raft down the Mississippi River toward the elusive and too-often-unreliable promise of the Free States and beyond.

While many narrative set pieces of Adventures of Huckleberry Finn remain in place (floods and storms, stumbling across both unexpected death and unexpected treasure in the myriad stopping points along the river's banks, encountering the scam artists posing as the Duke and Dauphin...), Jim's agency, intelligence and compassion are shown in a radically new light.

Brimming with the electrifying humor and lacerating observations that have made Everett a "literary icon" (Oprah Daily), and one of the most decorated writers of our lifetime, James is destined to be a cornerstone of twenty-first century American literature.

Great Decisions

Our Mattapoisett Woman's Club Great Decisions program is approaching the final weeks of the eight-week schedule. Our 30-member group of very motivated in-person and Zoom attendees dedicate each week to sharing opinions, experiences and possible solutions. All of the group from diverse backgrounds and a wide range of careers pepper the discussion with loads of questions.

We had two vitally important discussions on NATO and on Aritficial Intelligence.

After sending us a variety of materials outsourced and researched on his

own, Richard Van Inwegen, husband of MWC member Barb, discussed the importance of the finances and costs and titled his handout "Buckets of Money to Support NATO." NATO has offered 75 years' worth of alliances with 32 member countries. We all enjoyed an active discussion about responsibilities to our allies and our solidarity with the government of Ukraine. Many of the group expressed their concern about how the U.S. would exist without NATO members' economic and military support.

Our discussion on Artificial Intelligence was led by new member Jack Dean and son Greg with guest speaker Anatoly Lezhen who Zoomed in from Spain. Anatoly has worked for 20 years developing strategies to drive business growth and reimagining customer experience operations for AI driven industries. He told us that AI affects education, healthcare, manufacturing, retail and transportation. Jack, an electrical consulting and facilities engineer, told us how it all started about 30 years ago with computer scientist Raymond Kurzweil and explained the current and future prospects of AI. Kurzweil's new book is "Singularity is Nearer." Both Greg, who has followed AI developments for a number of years, and Anatoly talked about ChatGPT and possibilities in education and building faster, smarter systems. We had an engaging dialog covering many issues of positive and negative effects and if the information data used will be ethical. This fascinating topic challenged our regular way of learning, and we all had some laughs, not just heavy thinking. Anatoly recommended we read Nick Bostrom's "Deep Utopia: Life and Meaning in a Solved World."

Our last topic is "International Cooperation on Climate Change" and we hope to have a guest speaker join us.

I would like to again personally thank the Co-Chairs Ellen Stone, Anne and Art Layton for their assistance and support in keeping Great Decisions afloat this year. Many thanks go out to Marianne Hickey and Nancy Holland for their continued supply of coffee, tea and refreshments which are an added plus to our sometimes-heavy hearts while discussing current affairs along with foreign and domestic policy. I also extend our gratefulness to the Mattapoisett Free Public Library, Susan Pizzolato, Interim Director; and her caring staff who assist us each week. The Mattapoisett Woman's Club has kept this program alive for over 50 years. We follow a text of eight topic chapters with references, suggested readings and resources for each chapter along with a companioned DVD.
